I also had the chance to interview Sally Andrews (Elizabeth), star of the film who lives in Wellington, New Zealand. She enjoyed filming, but her favorite scene was when it rained in front of Hira's house. In between takes, the crew would rush up to her to give her towels and hot chocolate!

Sally is also a normal girl. She is 14 and a sophomore in high school. Her favorite subject is drama. In her spare time, she does tap, ballet and rock n' roll dancing. It's possible that she will come to the United States for the opening of "Her Majesty."

"We spread the word all over New Zealand for the cast," says Gordon, "and Sally, we thought, was the most authentic looking and honest girl in all of the auditions."

Gordon mentioned that everyone in the cast is nice, even though the brother is a brat in the movie.

This movie had excellent acting, a great story and beautiful scenery. I give it five stars and two thumbs up!
